Banning Fracking

The Prince George's County Council unanimously passed CB-03-2016 on April 12, 2016. The bill, which was supported by many citizens and local organizations, including the Moyaone Association, bans fracking in Prince George's County: Specifically, this bill is "an ordinance concerning hydraulic fracturing for the purpose of providing a definition for hydraulic fracturing in the Zoning Ordinance and adding hydraulic fracturing uses, including the hydraulic fracturing of a well for the exploration or production of natural gas, as a prohibited use in all zones within Prince George's County"

The following uses are prohibited in all zones: Hydraulic fracturing uses, including the storage, treatment, transfer, production materials, support activities, and the disposal of flow back, wastewater, or drill cuttings generated by hydraulic fracturing activities in the County, for purposes of preventing detrimental economic, environmental, and health effects of the use for the protection of the public safety, health, and welfare of the citizens and residents of the County.


While the State of Maryland currently is under a temporary fracking ban (expiring in 2017), CB-03-2016 ensures that the practice will not be allowed in our County. Thanks to all who supported this legislation and helped facilitate its adoption.



Citizen Scientists Wanted

According to Wikipedia: "Citizen science projects are activities sponsored by a wide variety of organizations so non-scientists can meaningfully contribute to scientific research. Activities vary widely from transcribing old ship logbooks to digitalize the data as part of the Old Weather project to observing and counting birds at home or in the field for eBird."



Amateur Naturalists Help the Scientific Community

In a 2013 New York Times article, columnist Akiko Busch says citizen science is "loosely defined as scientific research in which amateurs help experts gather data." ("Why I Count Glass Eels, New York Times, March 30, 2013; http://www.nytimes.com/2013/03/31/sunday-review/why-a-citizen-scientist-counts-glass-eels.html?_r=0). Busch goes on to say that "volunteers are continuing the traditions of generations of amateur naturalists who have observed and documented the events of the natural world" and that "at a time when the scientific community is ever more financially stretched, using volunteers to help collect data is good sense."

Mapping the Moon, Collecting Beetle Samples

Afriend is participating in a plant-monitoring effort called Project BudBurst (sponsored by the National Ecological Observatory Network and the National Science Foundation). Wikipedia lists many "citizen science" projects on the website: https://en.wikipedia.org/wiki/List_of_citizen_science_projects. There are bird projects, butterfly projects, moon-mapping projects, plankton-monitoring projects, star and planetary projects, herpetology projects, infectious disease projects, just to mention a few possibilities.

Another project is called Backyard Bark Beetles (http://www.backyardbarkbeetles.org), and involves making a trap out of a plastic bottle, adding some Purell, putting it out in the afternoon and collecting it in the morning. You scoop out the Purell with any tiny insects that may be there and mail the samples to some experts who will identify any bark or ambrosia beetles therein. There are a number of species in this group of beetles, and entomologists are interested in determining the ranges of the species, some of which are serious exotic pests that kill lots of trees. You will be notified of the species names once they are identified.

So whether you're looking for an outdoor project, or activities to do with children or friends, or want to contribute to research on our natural world, consider joining the ranks of the citizen scientists.

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
